Exciting changes on track

at Cunnamulla Railway Progress at the Cunnamulla Railway Station is certainly chugging along, thanks to an incredible amount of work put in by the Paroo Progress Association (PPA).

If your curiosity has been growing, here is the latest update thanks to a key member of the group, Karen Ticehurst.

What is the current status of the Cunnamulla Railway project?

The floor has been put down with the help of a local carpenter and workers including RESQ, and the builder is currently on site. The frame and cladding were completed by mid-February, with the internal fit out including all the audio visual technology completed six weeks after that, dependent on many variables.

Tell us the most exciting thing about the project?

Less than two years ago, the building was derelict and in need of a desperate face-lift, the local community had approached Council to take action, but fearing the huge cost associated with owning another asset the Paroo Shire Council were not keen, and rightly so, as assets are a huge drain on the ratepayer. The PPA were approached by members of the community and although keen, were not sure how they could utilise the space and bring income in to allow for future improvements and upkeep. An idea was born, to build a theatre that would show a nightly feature, the tale of local entrepreneurs and hard workers that developed the railway line, bringing the Westlander to the bush. Now as we get closer to the opening date, we hope this project will attract people from far and wide to stay longer in our town, spend more money creating more jobs.

How can the community support the PPA?

We will always need volunteers, all of the gardens and cleaning have been done using volunteers, most of the administration and all of the project management for the build have been completed by volunteers. We estimate that we have saved the project close to \$150,000 just by volunteering. We will need all the volunteers we can muster in the future, although there will be paid positions as well. We will need locals (who will become the

conductors) to welcome all the passengers every night during the season and sell our famous Fettler's pies and merchandise. In the off-season, we are already discussing other streams of revenue, particularly the use of the theatre to show latest release movies, and for audio visual commercial hire for groups

and companies. We very much need to still raise funds for future developments and to complete much of the necessary work to make the station a focal point for both locals and visitors.

hat benefits to Cunnamulla and the wider region do you see coming from this project?

This is a great opportunity for a community owned project to make a huge difference to attracting more tourists to our town. If every person who stays overnight to see the Cunnamulla All Aboard sound and light show spends another \$150 in town, then approximately about an extra \$1,000,000 a year will be spent locally, creating more jobs and services. Secondly, it is a fantastic way to commemorate the stories of the people whom the rail was a lifeblood, bringing with it supplies for all the region and taking our main commodity (wool) to the markets. It opened up opportunities for more social interactions with other towns through sporting and social activities. These stories have been recorded and are now about to be seen by a much larger audience.

What funding/grants have you received?

We have been more than fortunate in receiving two large grants and quite a few small ones. A Department of Innovation and Tourism Industry Development grant of \$350,000 has gone towards

the interpretative side of the build, including the audio visual resources, and the movie *Cunnamulla All Aboard*. From the Building Better Regions Fund we have received \$310,000, which goes toward the bricks and mortar, or in this case, steel and cladding. Although it sounds like a lot of money, the budget is extremely tight,

have also received

smaller rounds of funding for specific purposes, which all need to be acquitted, Community Gambling Fund, Regional Arts Development Fund, and Veterans and Community Grants.

Any committee members you want to give a shout out?

We have a great committee, and they have all helped at varying times. The Railway Committee consists of Merry Higgins, Judy Roberts, Kathy Ashley and myself. All have placed a huge amount of stress on their already stretched lives to make this happen, with their only reward being that Cunnamulla and surrounds have another viable ticketed event that will attract more visitors to our community.

Will the facility be available for the community to book and use?

We are currently looking at ways to utilise the space for other events, we hope in the future to renovate the kitchen to allow for catering and specific events. Conferences could even be held using our audio visual equipment. All these ideas will assist us with the ongoing costs and help us raise further funds for other activities we have planned in the future.

REX EXTEND DISCOUNTED FARES SCHEME

Regional Express (Rex) have announced that their popular 'Community Fare Scheme' has been extended until 31 December 2020.

The Rex Community Fare Scheme is available to 23 Queensland communities, including Cunnamulla, across the Rex operated Western 1 and 2 routes from Brisbane, the Northern 1 and 2 routes from Townsville and the Gulf route from Cairns.

Discounted fares are also offered between the regional communities resulting in more than 70 different fare combinations throughout the state.

Community Fares are available to book if your date of departure is more than 60 days away. All remaining unsold seats will then be made available at the Community Fares price from exactly 24hrs prior to departure.

So how can you book? Visit www.rex.com.au and search for the fare you require. If the Community Fare is available at your time of booking it will automatically come up in your bookable flight options. Just select that option and book as per usual.

Cunnamulla State School students connect with their community

A program that started in 2019, has been expanded upon in 2020 due to the great successes it had with its initial launch.

The School Mentoring Program at the Cunnamulla State School sees Years 7 – 12 participate in a 'community afternoon' which varies from grade to grade. For Term 1 the Year 9s have been visiting the Cunnamulla Library which has proved very popular.

Megan Clarke, a teacher at Cunnamulla State School, said that when the initiative was started the now-Year 9s were jealous of the Year 7s that got to visit the library once a week.

"The kids love going to the library to use the robots and experiment with different technologies," Megan said.

"It's also a chance to teach and

encourage them to use the library to help with their studies."

Librarian Tammy Hickey has also been enjoying the visits, and has been impressed with the kids' behaviour.

"They have all be participating and behaving very well, and have really been enjoying it," Tammy said.

For the other grades, the afternoon includes visits from a rotating team of community members and programs including Deadly Choices, Council's Youth Support Officer, and Beyond Broncos.

Meanwhile the Year 11s and 12s meet with Cheesy Anderson with Cheesy bringing in relevant guest speakers as well as a safe space to chat.

"This mentoring program is providing a great opportunity for our students to develop

community partnerships," Megan said.

"The school is especially excited about the Bangarra Dance Theatre company visiting in March. That will be a popular one for sure!"



Do you know about POLICELINK?

ANZAC Biscuit Recipe

ANZAC biscuits have long been a national icon and a family favourite. They were first called 'Soldiers' Biscuits' but after the landing at Gallipoli, they were renamed after our brave ANZACs.

So why not bake a batch this ANZAC Day, the recipe below is from Carmel Meurant's cookbook *Hey Mum.*. *Recipes from a Country Kitchen* which is available to purchase from the Cunnamulla Fella Visitor Information Centre.

INGREDIENTS

1 cup rolled oats 1 cup plain flour 1 cup sugar 3/4 cup coconut 125g butter 2 tbsp golden syrup 1/2 tsp bicarb soda 1 tbsp boiling water

METHOD

- 1. Combine dry ingredients in a large bowl.
- 2. Place butter and golden syrup in a saucepan over low heat until melted.
- 3. Mix bicarb soda and boiling water, add to butter and golden syrup and then mix into dry ingredients.
- 4. Place teaspoons of mixture onto greased oven trays and cook in a moderate oven for 20 minutes.

Safe barriers save lives

Did you know your portable pool or spa must comply with pool safety laws if it can hold more than 300mm of water and has a volume of more than 2,000L?

Although the heat of Summer is (hopefully) behind us, the weather in Paroo stays warm long enough for us to be able to enjoy a dip in the pool well into Autumn.

But did you know that by law, you must register your pool or spa? All pools and spas must also comply with relevant pool safety laws including appropriate fencing and removing any objects such as furniture that would allow children access to the pool.

These laws are in place to help prevent avoidable drownings so you may see our Local Laws Officer around town checking to make sure these safety precautions are in place.

Dog audit to improve safety and efficiencies

In an effort to improve safety a dog audit will be undertaken across the towns. This will also help to improve Council's processes and save money when handling and processing dog registrations.

When dogs are registered, it is easier to monitor and control roaming and vicious dogs, making our community a safer place to be.

As such, external officers will be undertaking a sweep of the towns to gain a better understanding of the number of dogs in the shire. Old and unregistered vehicles take up space in the yard, are an eyesore, a fire hazard, and provide a perfect habitat for snakes.

At the end of 2019, Local Laws Officer Joe Lewis started the #ParooPride Car Body Clean Up program which to date has seen over 30 cars and caravans removed from yards around Cunnamulla.

Joe said that he was very happy with the results of the program,

especially about how many people came on board.

"I'd say the program was very successful and on the whole people have been very cooperative," Joe said.

"There are still some more to go, but already it's a great start to 2020 driving around town and seeing old car bodies in homes and yards replaced with green grass thanks to the clean up and recent rain."

The program was organised as a free service to save residents the hassle and cost of removing the items themselves. Typically, if a resident were to ignore an issued notice it would cost approximately \$650 per vehicle.

Paroo Shire Council would like to thank everyone who got involved for showing their #ParooPride by cleaning up their yard for a fresh start in 2020.

SNAKES ARE OR THE NEW YARE AND STAY SAFE

There have been a number of incidents and reports of snake activity in Paroo recently, and although snakes are a part of life in the outback it's always good to be aware and stay safe.


Remember to try your best to stay calm if you come into close proximity of a snake as it is sudden movement that activates them to strike as they have very poor vision.

If you have no experience with snakes do not attempt to catch, trap or kill them, as this is when the greatest number of people have been bitten.

As ironic as it may seem, snakes are a protected species and fines up to \$10,000 can be the result of injuring or killing a snake.

To have a snake removed safely please contact one of Council's accredited snake catchers.

TBC Flood Restoration Works (if funding received)

UPDATE ÚN FLÚÚD RESTÚRATIÚN WÚRKS

Council's application for \$3.3 million worth of flood restoration works has got off to a good start with \$850,000 approved to date.

Some works have already been completed, and at this stage it is envisaged the majority of sites will be addressed before the end of June 2020 pending an early

approval by the Queensland Reconstruction Authority to commence works.

Due to the high value and tight deadline for the works, Council has engaged consulting firm Proterra Group to project manage and supervise the works. Proterra Group have extensive experience in this area delivering over \$150 million in flood projects since 2010.

It is expected that the majority of works will be delivered by Council's internal workforce, supplemented by local contractors and suppliers as required.

Cunnamulla Aerodrome upgrade project update

As reported in the 2019/20 Summer edition of the Paroo Review, the lighting at the Cunnamulla Aerodrome is being upgraded to improve the safety and ease of use for night-time landings.

Whilst the lighting is now halfway finished, substantial repair and restoration of the pavement airstrip has also been completed. The project involved the re-sealing the runway pavement of

the main strip, side strip, taxiway and apron, and re-painting of the aviation markings on the runway and apron areas.

This \$878,786 project was funded under the Remote Airstrips Upgrade Program (\$439,393), and was matched by Council.



Clean up and new bitumen for Yowah

While the storms in February brought some welcome rain, they did leave a bit of a mess behind in Yowah. Council crews have visited Yowah to help clean up including cutting damaged trees down, cleaning up debris and helping to fix roofs.

In addition to general clean-up, all the sealed roads in Yowah will be laid with fresh bitumen in time for opal and tourist season!

Sewer manhole relining

Council is currently working with their preferred contractors to line 90 sewer manholes throughout Cunnamulla.

The sprayed-on coating will protect the concrete manholes and lids from further corrosion due to the aggressive nature of sewage gases.

The head contractor for this work is Abergeldie, and they are working with Lionel and his team at Pfeiffer Coatings to deliver the works.

Please say g'day if you see them near a manhole near you.

Sewerage treatment plant update

Council has recently awarded the construction of the new Cunnamulla Sewerage Treatment Plant to Pensar.

Works are expected to commence in March 2020 and be completed around September this year.

This is the next step in the upgrade of Cunnamulla's sewerage system, following completion of sewer relining works in December last year.

he Cunnamulla Library's robotics program has caught the eye of German Social Scientist Simon Schmiederer.

Simon is currently completing a Master's degree in Library and Information Sciences in Berlin and is writing his thesis on the deployment of humanoid robots in libraries.

Tammy Hickey, Library Services Team Leader, said she was surprised when she first received Simon's email.

"It's not everyday you receive an email from the other side of the world. I didn't even know how he found out about us, turns out it was through a Google search!" Tammy said.

"Simon mentioned that Cunnamulla was of special interest to him because we have a humanoid robot ('Literator') in our library despite being in such a small town. "...We use our robots

W HAT IS THE THING YOU ARE MOST PROUD OF ACHIEVING OVER YOUR EIGHT YEARS AS MAYOR?

I was first spurred into running for Mayor to sort out the NDRRA 2012 Flood Event works. When we managed to finish the whole \$40 million program on time and on budget, that was a big achievement.

Other team achievements also come to mind – establishing the kindergarten in Cunnamulla through funding from Campbell Newman, the upgrading of the Cunnamulla Sewage System, new Civic Centre building and the River Walk and Spa project. The upgrading of halls and other facilities in satellite towns has also been a core goal of mine.

I also spent a lot of time lobbying state and federal governments for funding for roadworks and for extra money in south west Queensland area for dog fencing.

W HAT OTHER COMMUNITY ROLES HAVE YOU PLAYED?

I have been involved in the HOPE Project, was the Chair of Strong Families Strong Community project, Chair of South West Hospital and Health Service Board, Deputy Chair of Southern Qld Council of Mayors, and the Chair of South West Regional Economic Development from 2012 - 2016.

W HAT HAVE YOU LEARNED ABOUT YOURSELF DURING YOUR TIME AS MAYOR?

I got into this role for the flood event works because I wanted to contribute to the community.

I suppose I have learned that I have community service DNA. I have always been out serving the community and have learnt that I bring skills in strategic thinking and determination, and can bring people along on a vision.

OW DO YOU THINK IT IS DIFFERENT TODAY FROM WHEN YOU TOOK OFFICE?

There is more legislation around being a Councillor and the rules are much more complicated. And that's not necessarily a bad thing.

I think that running Council has to be treated the same way as being a board member of a company, you have to have a much higher level of business management skills to be an effective Councillor.

BACK, WHAT WAS YOUR WORST DAY ON THE JOB?

When I have to confront difficult staff issues, I never enjoy that.

LOOKING BACK, WHAT WAS YOUR BEST DAY ON THE JOB?

When Council received the grants for the new sewage treatment plant and reticulation works (\$9.1 million) and for the new Civic Centre building (\$5.312 million).

There was a lot of political work and lobbying that happened behind the scenes to make that happen.

W HAT CHALLENGES WILL THE NEW MAYOR AND COUNCILLORS FACE?

The main one that Council has control over is its economic sustainability. Creating efficiencies in Council's operation, asset management and cash flow are a big part of it.

ANY ADVICE OR PARTING WISDOM TO THE INCOMING MAYOR?

You will have to build the team as an effective management unit and run Council to the benefit of the whole shire, rather than a select few or just Cunnamulla. The challenge will be to introduce efficiencies which will make the Council more economically sustainable and deliver value for money in everything we do.

Updated Children and Young People Policy in effect

Paroo Shire Council welcomes children and young people into its libraries, facilities and for other programs and activities - and also want to ensure their safety while doing so.

In February the Children and Young People Policy that covered events and activities in Paroo Shire Council libraries, has been reviewed and amended to extend across all Council departments.

For the purpose of the policy, a child refers to those aged 10 years and under and a young adult are those aged between 11 - 18 years. The policy's aim is to clarify the role of Paroo Shire Council employees in regards to supervising children and young adults at Council facilities and

define the responsibilities of parents and carers.

For this reason, as Paroo Shire Council libraries, facilities and programs/activities are not licensed child-minding facilities, Council staff cannot take responsibility for the supervision of children or young adults.

Children aged 10 years or younger must be supervised by a parent, guardian or responsible carer who is at least 18 years old. Supervision requires that the person must be within sight of the child at all times.

The role of Council staff is to guide and assist children and young adults with the activity and not to undertake parental responsibilities. Staff also have the authority to ban or insist that anyone vacate or leave immediately if any of the following behaviours are exhibited:

- swearing
- fighting
- bullying
- misuse of furniture or equipment
- misbehaviour at programs
- unsafe swimming

> Jaquie Lait's says her story began 15 years ago when she was given a second chance at life.

After spending eight out of nine months in hospital during a pregnancy, Jaquie was given a 50/50 chance of survival on one particular day, due to domestic violence (DV).

Jaquie says that from this point she knew something had to change, and that she was the person to do it.

"I can absolutely resonate with other victims of DV and abuse," Jaquie said.

"I knew that with the experiences I had been through, that I could utilise them in a positive way - I just needed to learn how to do so."

Jaquie then completed a Diploma in Counselling which led her to also achieving a Diploma in Life Coaching.

In addition to her studies, Jaquie became a professional Muay Thai fighter within a year, and used her position as a professional

sportsperson to raise awareness of DV and abuse, becoming an ambassador for Fighters Against Child Abuse Australia (FACAA).

Jaquie's previous work experience includes being the Mindset and Life Skills Coach at the Nambour

State College on the Sunshine Coast.

"Although I've recently moved to Cunnamulla, beforehand during my time on the Sunshine Coast I worked with many people in the mindset field," Jaquie said.

"I am also currently writing a self-help book called 'Unleash the Superhuman Within' - a fun mindset and coaching book aimed at ages 12 - 20 years, or anyone who loves comic book superheroes!"

Jaquie says that she's excited about taking on the Youth Support Officer role and has lots of ideas in mind.

"I'm looking to bring new, fresh and fun programs and ideas to help re-engage the younger people in the region," Jaquie explained.

Paroo Shire Council is excited to have Sean on board for the interim and appreciate all the experience and skills he has to offer. Welcome Ricey!






Upcoming Council elections




